Hopefully the flu bug and all of the nasty illnesses that we have experienced lately are close to coming to an end! As we quickly enter into the final quarter of the 2016-2017 school year, I wanted to pass along some updates and reminders for Nashville #49. If anyone has questions or needs additional information regarding these updates, please feel free to contact me at school.

We are all certainly hoping that warmer and milder weather is on the horizon for March and beyond. I did want to update everyone on the status of the end-of-school schedule for the 2016-2017 school year. At this time, we have only used one emergency day this school year. If no additional emergency days are used, May 17 would be scheduled as a 2:10 PM dismissal and May 18 would be the final day of student attendance with a dismissal time of 11:30 AM. Additionally, the 8th grade graduation ceremony would be scheduled for May 12 at 7:00 PM if no more emergency days are used. We also have the approved 2017 -2018 school year calendar posted on our web site at www.nashville49.org. That calendar can be found by clicking the "Admin/Board of Education" link.

The state testing window is also quickly approaching and is scheduled for April 19-28. All students in grades 3-8 are scheduled to take the PARCC exam in the areas of read-

ing and math. Additionally, students in grades 5 and 8 will also take a science test as required by the state. Please let me know if you have any questions about the required state testing process.

As a reminder, Nashville #49 is again offering two days of pre-school screenings this year. The screening dates are April 6 from 12:00 PM-7:00 PM and April 7 from 8:00 AM-12:00 PM. Appointments can be made by contacting Mrs. Jenny Schuette at 618-327-3055.

Kindergarten registration for the 2017-2018 school year is scheduled for Monday, March 20 from 7:30 AM-5:30 PM. All families who have a child eligible for kindergarten next year can come to the school at any time during this time frame. If you have any questions about kindergarten registration, please contact the primary school office at 618-327-4304.







FRIDAY PHYSICAL EDUCATION RUN

K-3rd, 5th, & 7th Grade Physical Education – Mrs. Cruser Third Quarter News

Kindergarten through third grade students worked on increasing their ambidexterity through cup stacking. Kindergarten focused on using both side of their body to accomplish the basic three stack. The older students where given the opportunity to try more advance stacks. We then revisited throwing & aiming using new technology! Giant bugs and catfish took over the gym walls, while the students attempted to strike them down with dodgeballs. We are finishing the quarter learning a variety of line dances. The cupid shuffle, cha cha slide, chicken dance and electric slide where taught to the different age groups. Jump roping will be one of the main skills focused on in the fourth quarter.

Fifth and seventh grade students learned about motor fitness. After team activities, we discussed which motor fitness skills was improved: agility, balance, coordination, power, reaction time and speed. We are ending the quarter learning the basic volleyball skills. In the fourth quarter, students' fitness will be measure using FitnessGram testing. The results will be sent home.

Kindergarten and Pre-K Registration

Kindergarten Registration for the 2017-2018 school year will be held at the Primary School Office on Monday, March 20, 2017 between the hours of 7:30 A.M. and 5:30 P.M. Students do not need to attend.

Any child entering Kindergarten must be 5 years of age on or before September 1, 2017. Parents are required to submit a copy of the child's certified birth certificate and verification of in-district residency. Illinois State School Code requires a copy of the certified birth certificate upon registration; therefore we will not accept the hospital certificate.

Parents who know their child will be attending Nashville Primary School next fall will need to fill out a registration packet, to get the packet ahead of time please stop by the Primary School Office or call 327-4304 ext. 100 and one can be mailed to you.

A free screening clinic for children from birth to five years of age is being offered at the Nashville Primary School on Thursday, March 31, 2016 from 1-7pm and on Friday April 1, 2016 from 8:00am till noon. The clinic included checks of infanttoddler language development, motor coordination, and social skills. Preschoolaged children are also screened for pre academic skills, vision, and hearing. The screenings take approximately 30 minutes, and parents are provided with immediate feedback about their children's performance, as well as information about services for which their children may qualify. Early intervention, speech/language therapy, Prekindergarten, and Early Childhood special education programs are all available free of charge to eligible children. Participation in the spring screening clinics is an excellent means to enroll children in school district preschool classes for next fall when there may be waiting lists for this program. If your child is currently enrolled in Nashville Consolidated School District #49 preschool classes they will be screened during their class time, not at this screening.

Scheduled appointments are required; please call the Primary School office to make an appointment: 327-4304 ext. 100.



In the 3rd Quarter, 38 NMS students are being recognized as recipients of the Junior Hornet Award!

In order for a student to be recognized, faculty members nominate Middle School students. Nominations are based on eight different characteristics exemplifying good school citizenship traits. Included in those traits are the student's willingness to work towards their ability level, their attitude, respect for others, their cooperation, and their willingness to seek improvement, among others. Once the nominations are approved by the entire faculty, the student receives the award. Students may earn the award only once each school year. Students earning the "Junior Hornet Award" have their pictures displayed at the Middle School as well as having the group's picture published in The Nashville News. Certificates of recognition are awarded and the students are treated to lunch.
